

## PREFACE

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This special issue of the journal Logical Methods in Computer Science (LMCS) contains a selection of 8 articles in the area of Computability and Complexity in Analysis. Many, but not all of them were presented at the Seventh International Conference on Computability and Complexity in Analysis (CCA 2010) that took place on June 21-25, 2010 in Zhenjiang, China. The conference and this special issue are concerned with Computable Analysis, the theory of computability and complexity over real-valued data. Computability theory studies the limitations and abilities of computers in principle. Computational complexity theory provides a framework for understanding the cost of solving computational problems, as measured by the requirement for resources such as time and space. In particular, Computable Analysis supplies an algorithmic foundation for numerical computation.
