PREFACE

During the last four decades Jiří Adámek has worked on a large variety of topics and become a leading expert in category theory and its applications in algebra, topology and computer science. Jiří has very broad research interests, and an encyclopedic knowledge of mathematics to boot. Amazingly, Jiří has made significant and deep contributions all over. For example, he is well-known for his work on fixed points of functors, which provide the solutions to recursive domain equations and are therefore indispensable for the semantics of programming languages and the specification of abstract data structures. Other important contributions of Jiří are in categorical model theory, and more recently, in the theory of coalgebras and the foundations of automata theory. His work has always shown great mathematical beauty, and his writing style demonstrated his ability to present highly non-trivial material with great clarity.

Jiří started his academic career in socialist Prague, where he earned his C.Sc. degree in 1976 at the Czech Technical University under the direction of Prof. Věra Trnková on the topic "Categorical Theory of Automata". But it was not until the 1990s that he could have Ph.D. students of his own. We include short statements from most of those students.

Throughout his career, Jiří has been an extremely prolific author, having published more than two hundred research papers and written nine monographs and textbooks. For example, his book Abstract and Concrete Categories, co-authored with George Strecker and Horst Herrlich, is one of the most comprehensive textbooks on category theory and has by now contributed to the education of several generations of researchers in categorical methods. The monographs Automata and Algebras in a Category, coauthored with Věra Trnková, and Locally Presentable and Accessible Categories, co-authored with Jiří Rosický, have become standard references. Moreover, Jiří is still in the midst of his unusually productive career and is continuing to make important contributions to mathematics and theoretical computer science.

Jiří also has actively served the category theory and theoretical computer science community for many years. But his greatest service to the community is undoubtedly this journal, *Logical Methods in Computer Science*. He has founded the journal in 2004 and was its executive editor until 2015. He was the main driving force that brought the journal to life and that made it a big success—a high quality open-access venue for research articles on logic in computer science taken in a broad sense.

So what better way to celebrate Jiří's 70th birthday is there than this Festschrift, with a large variety of papers attributed to him and a workshop, PSSL'99 (aka. JirkaFest), featuring a diverse range of speakers, held in Braunschweig in March 2016. Both the Fest and Festschrift come with a great deal of love for Jiří and in acknowledgement of what he has taught us in the past, present, and future.

We would like to thank all the authors for their contribution to this Festschrift and also for their help in the reviewing and publication process. We are also thankful to the additional reviewers. In addition, our gratitude goes to the managing editors and the editor-in-chief, Lars Birkedal, for their support of this Festschrift. Last but not least, Katja Barkowski, Jürgen Koslowski, Frank Rust and Henning Urbat deserve our special thanks for organizing JirkaFest, the PSSL meeting in honor of Jiří in 2016.
